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### A LETTER FROM OUR CHAIR AND CEO

To all cohorts in this great endeavor,

Dear friends,

At this time last year, it was hard to imagine that our 2023-24 year would be the biggest in the almost 25-year history of this incredible organization. The level of unity achieved, the alignment amongst the chief protagonists—our incredible staff, partners, donors, and health professionals—the coherence between purpose, strategy, and execution, and the manifestation in action of passion and commitment, all represent the power that has propelled us into the future of serving more children in less time with greater impact.

Let there be no doubt that together, we are transforming the lives of children, their families, and, by extension, their communities. We have achieved a new level of oneness across the organization and the regions in which we serve. The children will always come first and remain at the center of everything we do. Everyone in the World Pediatrics network stands shoulder-to-shoulder to ensure equitable access to care. The innovation we realize demonstrates a movement from best practice to next practice. Whether in the U.S., the Caribbean, Latin America, Africa, or South Asia, we remain rooted in the community.

The work we have all done together, and the myriad ways everyone has contributed, resulted in more than 3,200 children being served, with over 6,900 services provided. There were in excess of 1,100 surgeries. About 2,200 professionals received nearly 2,900 hours of training and development. Our neonatal partnership with UNICEF began with a pilot in Guatemala and a conference in Honduras. Our partnership with Hospital Maria led to the government approving and funding a three-phase, five-year plan to double its capacity. We signed a term sheet with William and Mary to leverage our data to help organizations make better decisions. Our U.S. footprint continues to expand with the launch of Raleigh and the Triangle as a new region to support the growth of resources to serve more children. We completed the acquisition and integration of Childspring International, opening new opportunities for programs and collaboration in the Atlanta area.

Concurrent to these achievements, we completed the rebranding of the organization. From World Pediatric Project, we became World Pediatrics. With a revised name, logo, more refined purpose, vision, and mission, combined with explicit clarity around our modes of service—Deliver Care, Empower Care, and Transform Care—we have built a new platform for serving the most vulnerable of the vulnerable in underserved communities.

Our financial position continues to strengthen. Over the past three years, our donations have grown by nearly 2.5x while maintaining a healthy reserve ratio. Our gifts-in-kind this year exceeded \$35 million, and our cash donations topped the \$7 million mark for the first time in our history. These results demonstrate the level of confidence held by our donors and partners. We would be remiss not to mention the incredible work of our Executive Board in guiding our strategic direction, combined with the dedicated and passionate engagement of our development board members across all our markets.

The time is now, the field is vast, and the needs are immense. Together, we are making a big difference. We are driving change, transforming lives, and helping the children of today who will become the adults of tomorrow.

This incredible journey continues. We remain true to our core. We seek opportunities for greater service. We will continuously improve the way we work to achieve greater impact in the lives of children—the 30% of our population that represents 100% of our future. The World Pediatrics family is evolving from a stepping stone of success to a cornerstone of significance. Join us on this journey in any way and capacity possible. Through the power of unity, we can HEAL A CHILD and CHANGE THE WORLD.

We continue to send teams of experts to care for the immediacy of needs among children in underserved communities. Our work has expanded into building local capacity and empowerment for pediatric health to move towards sustainability. And we are making significant headway into transforming pediatric health care to uphold the sustainability of care for the children.

None of this would be possible without our global network of healthcare professionals, volunteers, partners and donors. We will continue to advocate for better healthcare policies, striving to make pediatric care a universal right.

### Pushing boundaries and redefining what's possible in pediatric care...



Born in Belize with a severe esophageal polyp, baby Tahjana faced immediate and complex medical challenges beyond the capabilities of local healthcare.

During a plastic surgery mission in Belize, Dr. Howard Krein recognized the urgency of her condition and arranged for her treatment at Nemours Hospital in Philadelphia. The World Pediatrics team swiftly facilitated her immigration and travel, with Dr. Beth O'Donnell, who was in Belize for neonatal care training, accompanying Tahjana to ensure she received expert care throughout the journey.

Tahjana's case highlights our **DOVE EFFECT**, where individual patient care is seamlessly connected with broader healthcare improvements. World Pediatrics not only delivered life-saving treatment for Tahjana but also reinforced our dedication to improving healthcare systems for the children of tomorrow.

### **Major Accomplishments**

In the fiscal year 2024, World Pediatrics achieved significant milestones that underscored our commitment to expanding and enhancing pediatric healthcare globally:

#### **Expansion:**

World Pediatrics opened a new hub in North Carolina, based in Raleigh, expanding our reach to connect more children to vital pediatric care. This move is part of our 10-year plan to enhance access, leveraging the region's medical innovation and community support.

#### **Acquisition:**

World Pediatrics expanded globally by acquiring Atlanta-based Childspring International, boosting our ability to deliver and empower advanced pediatric surgical care. This partnership combines Childspring's expertise with our programs, enhancing support for underserved children. Atlanta's medical and donor strengths play a key role in advancing our mission.

#### **Regional Fundraising Teams:**

Building capacity in regional fundraising is a key component of our strategy. This year, World Pediatrics established fundraising teams in Guatemala and Honduras, expanding our global network and deepening community engagement. These teams play a critical role in mobilizing resources and creating sustainable, region-specific efforts to support our mission.

#### **Fundraising Success:**

In FY 2023-2024, World Pediatrics exceeded \$7.1 million in donations. With our 4X Gift-In-Kind, this achievement highlights the impact of our efforts through donor generosity, enabling the expansion of access to advanced pediatric healthcare by delivering, empowering, and transforming care.

### **REGIONAL HIGHLIGHTS**

- Guyana: Successfully completed pilot engagement with plans for further growth.
- **Development Partner Recognition:** Recognized by the OECS Health Unit, allowing participation in quarterly health forums and policy discussions. CEO Vafa Akhavan and ED Lauren McIntosh attended the OECS Health Conference in the BVI in October 2023.



- **Nursing Capacity Building:** Facilitated and supported a nurse from St. Vincent to pursue a Post Graduate Diploma in Pediatrics Nursing at the UWI Cave Hill Campus. Upon her return, she will train colleagues in pediatrics.
- **Telehealth Clinics:** Launched 2 telehealth clinics in Upper Extremities in St. Kitts and Nevis and Dominica.
- Upper Extremities Surgery: Conducted our first Upper Extremities surgical team in St. Lucia, completing 20 surgeries.
- **Pulmonology Clinic:** Hosted our first Pulmonology Clinic in SVG, addressing needs following the 2021 La Soufriere Volcanic Eruption, with over 100 children seen.
- New Speech and Language Clinics: Held two clinics in Dominica, each serving over 90 children.
- Oculoplastic Subspecialty: Added Oculoplastic as a subspecialty, collaborating with the Plastics and Ophthalmology team in SVG to perform surgeries on children across the region.

### **MEET JAYVORN**



Jayvorn Wynne, now 10 years old, has been a World Pediatrics patient since he was just 2 years old. Diagnosed with neurofibromatosis—a benign tumor located on his face—Jayvorn's condition affects the brain, spinal cord, and the nerves that transmit signals throughout the body. He also suffers from deprivation amblyopia, which has diminished his vision due to a plexiform neurofibroma on his right upper lobe. These conditions have led to bullying in school and uncomfortable stares in public, deeply impacting Jayvorn's social life.

In February 2024, the ophthalmology team led by Dr. Donna Brown visited his home country and performed a successful surgery for Jayvorn. The procedure included tightening the muscle responsible for raising his eyelid, lifting the eyelid itself, and performing a canthoplasty—a reconstructive procedure that reshapes the corner of the eye. When Jayvorn's grandmother saw him after the surgery, her joy and gratitude were overwhelming, knowing he could finally open his eye and see better.

Jayvorn is now being referred to Dr. Rhodes for resection surgery in the near future. This upcoming surgery promises to further boost his confidence, helping him live a more normal, happier life.

### **MEET HANNIA**



Hannia Marroquin was diagnosed with scoliosis in 2018, and after frustrating experiences with physical therapy and discouraging comments from others. After being told by a second doctor that her condition couldn't be fixed, she refused to give up. Through her own research as a teen, she discovered World Pediatrics and Dr. Cobar on Instagram. Learning that surgery was an option, Hannia underwent a lifechanging spinal procedure. Now, two years later, she's thriving—able to do activities she once feared, having graduated from high school, and currently in her first year of medical school. Inspired by her experience, Hannia hopes to help others just as World Pediatrics helped her.

### **REGIONAL HIGHLIGHTS**

- **Healthcare Network Expansion:** Expanded our network to 31 active medical facility partners from 29 in FY 23, ensuring more children receive care.
- Cardiac Capacity Investment: Enhanced cardiac care at Maria Hospital Pediatric Specialties in Honduras, securing an additional USD 1 million from the Honduras Ministry of Health.



- **Support for Local Surgical Teams:** Supported seven local surgical teams in Honduras and El Salvador, enhancing their ability to reach more children in their own countries.
- Medical Training: Offered 2,307 training hours to 940 medical providers.
- **Growth in Funding and Partnerships:** Strengthened funding and strategic partnerships with organizations such as World Vision Honduras, Food for the Poor, CEPUDO Honduras, UNICEF Guatemala, Ronald McDonald Bogota, Ronald McDonald House Mexico, and Benemerito Comite ProCiegos y Sordos in Guatemala.













• Sustainability Initiatives: Hired fundraising staff in Honduras and Guatemala, developing plans to boost program sustainability.

### REGIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

• **US Hospital Network Expansion:** We added four new hospitals to our network this year—Shriners Children's Portland, Shriners Children's Chicago, Nemours Children's Hospital, and Oklahoma Children's Hospital—bringing our total to 22. This expansion helps us meet care timelines and broaden access to advanced pediatric healthcare.







- Volunteer Support: Non-medical volunteers now contribute over 100 hours monthly, providing vital practical and social support to our World Pediatrics families.
- Powerful Partnerships: Several key funding partners, including individual donors, helped make it possible this year to exceed our goals. A new partnership with Food for the Poor strengthened our support network by assisting Latin American children receive transformative surgical care in the U.S.



### **MEET KEVIJAH**



Kevijah's journey with World Pediatrics began urgently. Just weeks old and born with esophageal atresia, she was rushed to St. Louis in February for life-saving care. Her mother, Saysha, had tirelessly sought help, even appearing on Belizean TV. In Belize, the resources weren't available, but World Pediatrics brought hope.

After her initial discharge, Kevijah returned home, but breathing difficulties sent her back to the U.S. early. Doctors in St. Louis discovered her airway was dangerously narrow and performed several procedures to help her breathe more easily. Once stabilized, she underwent successful surgery to correct her colorectal malformation.

Kevijah's strength has steadily grown—she now giggles and smiles in St. Louis, filling out her baby cheeks. Though she still awaits neurosurgery for her tethered cord, her journey is one of resilience and hope, with World Pediatrics by her side, ensuring she will one day return home healthy and thriving.

### **MEET CAROLINA**



Eight-year-old Carolina, from rural Belize, was born with a rare complete facial cleft. Her parents, David and Briceidy, face financial challenges in providing for her medical needs. Since 2018, World Pediatrics has been a lifeline for Carolina, supporting her through multiple surgeries.

In 2024, Carolina traveled to the U.S. for her fourth surgery and is now back in Belize, recovering well. World Pediatrics has committed to caring for her until she turns 21, ensuring that she not only receives surgical care but also has access to all the traveling teams visiting Belize across various specialties, depending on her needs. Her parents are deeply grateful for this support, knowing Carolina's ongoing medical journey is in good hands.

### GLOBAL SPONSORSHIP PROGRAMS

### **Growth of Global Sponsorship Programs**

Through the integration and growth of global sponsorships, World Pediatrics has accelerated the regionalization of program structure and leadership, expanded service delivery models, and increased program reach to more efficiently and effectively care for more children in less time.



### 119 CHILDREN RECEIVED SPONSORSHIP









- Haiti: 45 children received orthopedic, general surgery, and cleft lip and palate surgeries.
- Strong in-country partnerships and a region-led model have enabled World Pediatrics' programs to continue to thrive despite the COVID pandemic and recent violence. Local staff in Haiti partner with a surgeon in Cap-Haitien for cleft lip and palate surgeries and with two hospitals in Port-au-Prince for orthopedic and general surgeries.
- India: 43 children received orthopedic surgeries.
- Sierra Leone: 20 children received general surgery interventions.
- Vietnam: 11 children received support to access orthopedic surgeries.



### **NEONATAL** GLOBAL PROGRAM

In FY24, we expanded the neonatal capacity-building program into four new countries in Latin America: Guatemala, Honduras, the Dominican Republic, and re-engaged with Belize for the first time in 10 years, as well as one new country in the Caribbean—the British Virgin Islands.

### Our neonatal capacity-building programs are now active in 10 countries

- Partnership with UNICEF: In Guatemala, World Pediatrics partnered with UNICEF to assess neonatal needs in Huehuetenango, where the mortality rate is double the national average. With UNICEF's support, we coordinated with the Ministry of Health and assessed three health centers. Insights from traditional birth attendants (comadronas), who manage most home births, are informing our efforts to improve neonatal care. This partnership is crucial, fostering trust with authorities as we prepare to roll out birth worker training in FY25.
- Honduras Partnership: Collaborated with Fundacion Angelitos in Tegucigalpa for their Neonatal Congress in February 2024, sponsoring four clinicians to present to nearly 300 attendees from across the country.



Neonatal capacity-building teams: Supported by a Rotary International grant from the
Kirkland Rotary Club of St. Louis, the Barbados West Rotary Club, and the Maria Holder
Memorial Trust, continued delivering education on preventing neonatal asphyxia, providing
interventions for premature infants, and addressing other key areas of mortality prevention in
six countries across the Eastern Caribbean.
